CHAPLAIN'S REPORT Looking back on 2015



Remember this?? The bigger picture of La Côte Church life

At last year's AGM in April 2015, this balcony view gave us a summary of the life of La Côte Church. Our big story is that we are a community of Christians committed to growing together in love for God and for our neighbour. Our church has "happened" in all the ways shown above, because under God, people have given time, effort and energy to it! Our Annual Report is thus an opportunity to thank and honour all of you who have taken part in the life of our Church this last year and of course, in many years previously. Please take a moment to look again at the balcony view above and receive the thanks from our Church for playing your part somewhere in there. Our big story of La Côte Anglican Church is made up of many smaller stories, some of which are conveyed in our AGM report below. Please read on to find out more. I would like to add a few highlights which have been a rich blessing to the overall life of our Church.

LEADERSHIP The balcony view of a full and active church raised the question of leadership last year. Over the past twelve months there has been a growing sense of shared leadership in different spheres of life, for example in the small groups, in our children and youth programme, in our learning seminars and in our worship. Thank you to all of you who have been involved in these ways.

PRESENCE as our Strategic Priority:

PRESENCE on-line. We have become more present and up-to-date online through our website, largely thanks to our new webmaster, Christina Geschonke, with the backing of Val Geschonke and Olivier Froidevaux. Thank you to this valuable team.

Administratively, we have members of our Church who have been working hard in the background to improve our communications. Bev Espasandin now sends out the weekly bulletin and assists with big tasks such as our worship rotas and bookings for our Church. Vincent Coo manages with our address list and email lists, updating them regularly for the smooth running of our community life. A huge thank you to this team for this ministry among us.

PRESENCE in Nyon This has developed over the last year significantly through involvement with other local churches to support the new groups of refugees in our local towns. The Nyon Thursday Space group has also become more established. In addition, we are developing stronger ties with the ecumenical group of churches in the Nyon area.

PRESENCE in Divonne We have had some significant events this last year marking this presence, both with the Musical Soirée in July and with the Tenth Anniversary in September when Bishop Robert came to share in our celebration. As you will see from Julia Chambeyron's report, the 1905 application is going ahead as I write.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH

In terms of our other chosen priority for 2015 we continue to appreciate the work of our Youth Leader, Calen Gayle, with our young people. He is seeking to support them through regular gathered sessions and to connect with them individually through mobile and email contact and coffee stops. Last year an experienced youth worker from Brussels came for a weekend to support Calen, to give him valuable feedback and direction.



Gingins Nativity Service

FINANCES has been a further priority this last year. Our aim was to support the wider structures of our church community, enabling us to be a Christian presence in the La Côte and Pays de Gex region. Last year we began the year budgeting for a small deficit. However, thanks both to the committed work of our finance group, together with the creative communications of "the Giving Tree" team and the generosity of many of you in our Church, we were able to end the year in the black!

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE COMING YEAR We will seek to consolidate our two priorities in the midst of our church worship and overall life. I would like us to give attention to how we give the glory back to God and how we deepen our love for God and our neighbour through belonging to La Côte Church both as we gather and then as we scatter to our homes, neighbourhoods, families and places of work. It has been a particularly challenging year for my colleague and our Assistant Chaplain Julia, due to on-going health problems. Yet she has remained a tremendous support in countless ways to individuals and to the life of our whole community, especially in Divonne. In spite of the challenges she faces, Julia has shown great courage and faithfulness in her ministry and has continued to offer her ministerial gifts and wisdom both to me as her colleague and to those she serves across our chaplaincy. We continue to keep her in our prayers and give thanks for her leadership and her care. There are some exciting opportunities coming up this year to nourish our discipleship and I hope we can continue to explore how our corporate worship and shared life inspires us for our daily walk with God.

GINGINS WORSHIP

This last year has offered a rich variety of services from the more traditional to contemporary.

Lay leadership for worship and reflections

A good number of our lay people have helped in leading worship and with reflections in Gingins this last year. Thank you to all of you for the time, energy and faith that you have shared with the Gingins congregation. Special thanks to Chris Potter, David and Liz Bramley, John and Peta Tracey and Funke Staeuble, together with all of you who assist with our rota. Without you, our worship would be much less diverse and far reaching.

Visiting clergy and lay leaders We give thanks also to visiting clergy and lay readers who have led us in worship and learning, including Alan Amos, Betty Talbot and Maree Wilson.

Music As in past years, we have enjoyed throughout this year a wide variety of music and worship thanks to all our musicians offering time and talent. Thank you thus to Harold Corrigan and the Gingins Song group (who celebrated their 100th service in November with a special service of thanksgiving for the Song Group. Thank you too, to Richard, Ray, Pat, Steve and Monika Rawcliffe and Mark Charles for your dedicated service to our church. It is invaluable. Thank you too, to all those who have sung or played other instruments through the year to enhance our worship, especially Calen Gayle on the flute. We were also delighted to welcome Andrew Donaldson who works at the WCC as the liturgical coordinator and his wife Wendy, who led us in a worship workshop in summer 2015. We hope we can fit in another such workshop before they move back to Canada.

Worship workshop In the same vein we were very pleased to welcome Alison and Peter Callway from Rochester Diocese, to lead a worship workshop in August. This explored Anglican liturgy as a framework for our worship with a group of our lay members who enjoy putting together and leading services.

Baptisms Congratulations to the two families last year who had their children baptised in our services. Maximilien and Felix von Tscharner were baptised on 20 September, and Emilia Pal on 1 November at an All Saints celebration.

Harvest Gingins was beautifully decorated for our Harvest Celebration and our theme was the feast of St Francis, welcoming our local Salvation Army officer who described his work and faith with great joy and enthusiasm.

Ecumenical Links We continue to give thanks for the generous spirit of our Gingins church hosts and for the worship we enjoy doing together: this last year for a sunrise Easter celebration and breakfast, and later in the year sharing in a joint Advent Sunday worship. We are also, mainly through Carolyn's involvement in the Pastorale Nyonnaise, building links with the local ecumenical body in Nyon. Our Bonmont celebration with all the local churches in September gives us an opportunity to worship together and focus our prayers on the needs of Switzerland.



Bossey Institute Once again we have enjoyed being linked with the international students on courses at the Bossey Ecumenical Centre and welcoming those who have joined us in worship. Thank you to Margaret Owen who has coordinated this key link. We are much the richer for being involved with this ecumenical body.

Thank you to all those who have helped to nurture the faith of our children throughout this last year, from the very little ones to those heading into the teenage years. We would not be the sort of family Church we seek to be without you sharing your time, energy and own faith journey.

CHILDREN'S WORK AT GINGINS

Greater involvement of children and youth in All-age Worship Our children and youth have been enjoying their groups over this last year in Gingins, participating in and leading worship. This was especially noticeable over the Christmas period when they put on a very well-rehearsed nativity play with some strong carol singing, and the older group also performed a sketch during our Christingle worship. Recently we have aimed to include children and young people in our All Age Worship, to help in as many ways as possible, so that they feel involved rather than more passive.

Children in Communion It was a joy to welcome four young people around our Communion Table last June, after Calen Gayle and a team of volunteer leaders had prepared them through the Spring to early summer terms. Welcome, thus, to Luke and Jasper Courtney, Alexander Potter and Millie Debell.

There are currently three **Sunday Club** groups in Gingins:

3-6s – led by Naomi Grobéty and assisted by Mary Gosal

7-10s – led by Jane Robinson, Alice Debell, Tania Ahlstrom, assisted by Kate Shepherd and Elaine Walsh.

11-14s – led by Warwick and Helen Foster, Geoff and Sharon Senogles, Dan and Kate Weston – and our Youth leader, Calen Gayle.

Attendance fluctuates, but we welcome between 10-20 children each week. The youngest group uses "*Minizone*" resources, whereas the two older groups are at the moment using the "*Roots*" materials. This follows our lectionary readings and is therefore more in co-ordinated with our church worship. The group leaders aim to get together once a term to review and plan for the coming sessions. We are glad to have welcomed some more parents (mums!) into the leadership roles, but we would be glad if there were others who would like to take part in this crucial and rewarding work. We have no crèche at present for the under 3 age group, yet seem to have a steady influx of smaller children. We would be grateful to anyone who would like to help start up a crèche at Gingins (during the Sunday serivces (4-5 p.m.). LA CÔTE CHAPLAINCY COUNCIL REPORT

Since the 2015 AGM on 26 April, there have been eight meetings of the La Côte Chaplaincy Council. The Chaplain welcomed Trevor Davies, who replaced Susan Werkhoven as Archdeaconry Synod Representative to the first post-AGM Council meeting on 26 May, and officers were elected: Lay Vice-Chairman: Dwight Moe, Treasurer: Craig Thompson, Secretary: Valerie Geschonke. As a first step towards becoming part of a community of associations and help us to obtain charitable status in the canton of Vaud, a modification of the Church's statutes were approved at an E.G.M. in July. A further revision will be required at the 2016 AGM.

With the aim to bring to the community transparency about finances, the Giving Tree focus emerged in 2015. On 24 May, a presentation was made during a service at Gingins and the congregation was told that the way the Council handled the issue of church finances had changed. It was being dealt with on an informative, factual level. We had to fulfil our commitments and pair priorities and funding. Youth work was an integral part of the Church mission and the Council understood that in order to fund it in the future on the present scale, with a paid youth worker, the Church's income would have to increase in 2016 and beyond. The community did meet its financial

aspirations in 2015 and income was significantly higher than 2014 because of donations, collections and increased pledges, many of which arrived in December. The Finance Committee considered that in 2016, similar levels could be reached and suggested presenting to the AGM an option of either a similar event to the Autumn Fair or a Gift Day with a community-focused event held in the autumn of 2016. Many members of the Church had been actively engaged and significant amounts had been raised for charitable causes. At Gingins, the total going to charity represented 7-8% of income. At the end of 2015, Craig Thompson informed the Council that he would stay in the role as Treasurer for one more year.



In advance of a visit by the Diocesan Bishop, Dr. Robert Innes, to La Côte on the weekend of 12-13 September, the Council looked at the new Strategy for the Diocese in Europe, entitled "Walking together in faith" and compared our Church mission statement and priorities with the Diocesan strategy, to determine in practical terms where we were in line with this. Our agreed strategy was a lot simpler (Children / Youth and Presence). We sharpened

up our priorities for the following six months with the aim to integrate children into worship and foster discipleship. During his visit, Bishop Robert spent an evening with the Church Council and presented his thoughts on the situation in the Diocese. He made an interesting comparison between the chaplaincies in our Diocese and those in the UK. Members of the Council discussed the challenges and priorities of our church and offered an overview of the history of our growth. The Bishop remarked on the surprisingly large number of outside-church activities in this rural area. Later, Bishop Robert led a service in Divonne and at Gingins, assisted our two Chaplains and Paul Holley, the first to be appointed to our Church when it became established as an independent chaplaincy.

Among other issues discussed at Council meetings during 2015 were Social Action, Youth work and Church communications. The Chaplain did not propose to the Council the introduction of a new priority for 2016, but to continue to grow further and to fine-tune the youth and presence priorities. The Council suggested that having built up the various presence activities, we could look to raise awareness of them within a broader section of the community in 2016. The Chaplain encouraged the Council to consider how we could not only be present, but passionately, distinctively or transformatively present in our communities and beyond.

YOUTH WORK REPORT

Over the past year and a half, I have come to know the children of our churches through our ministry to the various groups **SAS**, (Special Activities Scene) for 10-14 year olds, **Sherbert** for 14-19 year olds, as well as the Sherbert Sunday editions for older teens at Gingins, and **Chatfaith**, a similar discipleship programme for older teens in our Divonne based congregation. Recently I have



also become more involved with the Sunday Club activities. We have been particularly graced with young people with busy lives, and we all can learn from each other. Please support these discipleship and outreach groups in your prayers, and contact me if you are interested in talking to our youth about a specific topic, or hosting an event on occasion.

Chatfaith

This year, Chatfaith has largely focused on Mark's Gospel, and preparations for the Christmas play, which was written by a member of the group, directed by Ed Kelley with staging help from Allison Ball. It took a whimsical, though reverent, look at the Nativity from the perspective of two narrators. They also put together an enjoyable musical performance for the garden party last summer. I thoroughly enjoy spending time with this group, as well as the younger ones, even if only every two weeks, and welcome individual meetings as another way of getting to know these kids better. While few in attendance at times, these older teens are very resourceful and there is lively interaction during the sessions. In the coming weeks we will take a look at the lives of some of the prophets, asking what Jesus might have to say through our lives and the lives of those around us.

Sherbert

Sherbert has undergone significant shifts. The group previously met in the Gingins parish rooms on alternate Fridays but will now move to Saturday evenings in Divonne in order to integrate the older teens living outside the town into the group. The format of the evenings remains constant: food, fun and foraging the Scriptures for a sense of God's direction, with a prayer to close the evening. It is exciting to see the development of personal prayer



lives of some of our older teenagers. Plans are in place for the commencement of a regular youth band, and to invite those who might feel less at ease with a standard discipleship group. We would like to see female presence in the adult supervision of the group, and outreach to outsiders who do not normally go to church, not neglecting those wanting to deepen their faith. Among other topics, the group has discussed the refugee question and climate change and as we begin growing again after fluctuating attendance, we will look into other topics that fall under the umbrella theme for this year "making wise choices". There have been efforts to encourage this group to interact in different ways with the wider community: going to see films, supporting friends at local musical and theatre performances and sharing food and fellowship with the newly arrived refugees in Nyon with members of Westlake Church. Our youth is seeking to grow outside the physical walls of the church to follow Christ sincerely in a world of moral, spiritual and intellectual complexities. One member of Sherbert has very closely been involved with the Paris Climate Talks as a liaison for the Lutheran World Federation youth and another will also attend an inter-church Winter Retreat with this theme in the coming weeks, as will one from our SAS group.

Special Activities Scene (SAS)

SAS now exists in two locations sharing time between Divonne and Trélex. It is still hosted by Ted Talbot, but now also by the Bolan-Campbells. The group has a steady attendance of four to five young people, occasionally bolstered by attendance of younger siblings and friends invited by the more frequent attendees. Rather than an in-depth foray into Scripture, sessions have entailed a consideration of the ethos of friendship, in less stuffy language: how does Jesus invite us to friendship with him, and how might we fully understand friendship with each other. The activities have engaged us with the local EMS singing Christmas carols, skating in Coppet, and rolling each other into coats of toilet paper! Younger teens in attendance are at times the most eager to pray, and more biblically astute than one might think. I hope that this group will continue to grow to include those from outside the La Côte community, and lead to increased interaction with others, such as the Winter Retreat organized for young people from various local churches. The talents of these younger teens are quite impressive. Our group now boasts its own Website and Facebook page, thanks to the efforts of our new and eager Webmaster! We look forward to moves and merriment, to growth and grace, and to our retreat as well as the summer SAS camp.

Sunday Club

While I do not have a regular involvement with Sunday Club, I have had a significant role in 2016 in the teaching of this group. Last year's Communion Course training was also an enjoyable time and very cultivating for the faith of some of our younger teens. We usually follow the *Roots* syllabus. Gavin Macpherson, the Bishop's youth worker and RE teacher and who is now supporting the Diocese's youth work visited la Côte on the weekend of 20-22 November to look at how we could further strengthen our youth work. He engaged with a broad cross-section of children, leaders and parents during the bowling evening, the Divonne morning service and Christmas play rehearsal. His advice was encouraging.

I feel I have a good entente with these young people, partly facilitated by the experience with SAS, and endeavour to strengthen this aspect of my ministry, and welcome your support and advice. I would like to extend thanks to those who have

sought to include me in the lives of the young people outside the planned activities. I appreciate the time I spend with people during these invitations which are among the highlights of a youth worker's ministry, reminding us of our calling to serve and care for our younger people by caring for their families and their lives as a whole. I hope to meet more parents, particularly those interested in new outreaches or discipleship activities for their children. I welcome prayer, protest, and general commentary as I seek to serve these young people, and you, with increased efficacy and greater love in Christ.

Safeguarding at La Côte

Safeguarding of children and vunerable adults is a top priority for the Diocese of Europe, a fact that Bishop Robert highlighted when he visited our Church in the autumn of 2015. A full and extensive revision of the diocesan Safeguarding Policy has been made and will mark a minimum standard across the Diocese. If local law is stronger on any item, that will apply to strengthen it in that country. The protocol identifies key responsibilities and has guidance on staff selection, whether in paid or voluntary roles. There are a number of changes and new aids to help individual congregations fulfil their obligations as safe churches. The Diocese also developed a new course on keeping "vulnerable adults" safe. In addition to the on-line training courses, the Diocese is looking to recruit more than 20 people with training skills who will be invited to a "train the trainers" course in the spring

will be invited to a "train the trainers" course in the spring of 2016.

This year at La Côte, we have continued to update our safeguarding checks for all our helpers and aim to have this process complete by March 2016. We have also begun to roll out the diocesean safeguarding training to our Chaplains and Churchwardens. This will be extended to all helpers as we move towards the spring. We have also produced a La Còte Safeguarding Policy which will supplemented more detailed be by procedures, highlighting best practice for helpers. SWISS ARCHDEACONRY SYNOD

The Archdeaconry Synod takes place twice a year: in January or February and in June. La Côte's Synod Representatives are Trevor Davies and Val Geschonke. The summer Archdeaconry Synod was held on 20 June at All Saints Church in Vevey. The main speaker was Adrian Mumford, Diocesan Secretary, who talked about how the Diocese saw itself developing in the future, and Safeguarding, a big issue on the Church of England and Diocesan agenda. Wider and better protection is now required

for children and vulnerable adults. However the background checks could be problematical for people who have lived in certain countries where documentation cannot be obtained. Extended training programmes are available for all people involved with children and vulnerable adults. At La Côte, on-line training on awareness raising can be undertaken via the Safeguarding Officer, Katharine Minton.

The Diocese is now entitled to funds from the Church Commissioners. However, the Diocese in Europe did not receive the expected funding the previous year, but it was enough to finance the first freestanding Archdeacon in Europe. This will be Canon Colin Williams, who will be responsible for northern Europe. The Church of England will change the way it allocates funding in the future within the United Kingdom, with more support for growing parishes.

The new Diocesan Environment Officer, Revd. Elizabeth Bussmann, asked chaplaincies to be much more aware of our collective responsibility towards the environment and the effects of climate change. Chaplaincies who had no Environment Officer were asked to think about appointing one.

The principal speaker at the Archdeaconry Synod held on 6 February at St. Ursula's Church in Berne was Canon William Gulliford, Diocesan Director of Ordinands. He went through the very thorough process of selection and training of ordinands for ministry in our Church. This covers examination of a candidate's vocation, spirituality, personality, qualities of leadership, educational criteria, family relations, with interviews at various levels to assess the suitability of a candidate. Vocation seminars, theological courses, possible internship and curacy placement follow. The aim of the Diocese is to attract 50% more ordinands under the age of 32 by 2020. Not all candidates in our Diocese are of Church of England or British background. This can present certain problems on both sides. However, this Diocese belongs to the Church of England with the Sovereign as Head, and both candidates and congregations have to accept that fact.

Finances balanced well in 2015 with income and expenditure mostly within budget. Only minor adjustments are being made in 2016. We continue to contribute to the Anglican chaplaincy in Athens, which actively supports the many refugees there. Also the aid agency of the OCs Partner Sein. Various amounts were also paid out of the SAMT Fund (supporting ministry training) to clergy and lay people in the Archdeaconry for further education. Several SACEP (Swiss Archdeaconry Christian Education Programme) events are planned for 2016, two of which focus on the refugee/migrant problem.

Our Bishop has drawn up a Diocesan Strategy Plan, and all chaplaincies have been asked to work on this. The Synod looked at how individual chaplaincies were approaching the aims. The Strategy will be the subject of the Bishop's address to the next Synod in Geneva on 25 June 2016.

SOCIAL ACTION REPORT

Work at La Côte in 2015 with local Refugees and those in need father afield

At the end of September 2015, there were 5,600 asylum seekers in our with others arriving. Members of the Social Action team make a weekly collection of clothes and other needed items that are delivered to the two Day Centres closest to us. Two of



our members have worked with the asylum seekers since the shelter opened in Nyon in 2009. We also set up and ran a local Garden project. We have also provided, through the generosity of parishioners, a variety of items such as a dishwasher to the newly opened Nyon Day Centre, and much needed items for individuals and families being moved into private housing. Members of our church have also offered accommodation/rooms to rent to individual refugees who have been granted permission to stay but who struggle to find accommodation of their own. In addition, we offer language lessons and conversation, mainly English and weekly Art Therapy sessions at the Gland Day Centre. When possible, we include asylum seekers whom we get to know in church and family activities, offer transportation and assist with legal procedures. Through a coordinator, refugees are linked up with members of our community (church and other) to assist with gardening, decorating, moving house etc. in order to earn money. Our Chaplain Carolyn works with a representative of the Westlake Church in Nyon, in a weekly "open house" for refugees and with the Pastor of the local Swiss church in Gland, ministering to the asylum seekers in general and to individuals with specific needs. Apart from these local projects, our Church looks to the wider world and has made the following donations to charities in 2015:
