Chaplain's Overview

The AGM is a good moment to recall our Mission Statement – and even to bring it into question: La Côte Anglican Church is:

“A Christian Community committed to growing in love for God and for our neighbour”.

So, are we? YES or at least aspiring to be so. My prayer is that our church life in all its varied shapes and hues bears witness to this statement.

As you read through the reports below, I hope you will be able to glimpse this mission statement fleshed out in worship and service, in the lows and highs of our life together. Thank you to everyone who has sent in their reports about many aspects of church life. We thank God for another year of many blessings and ask for his strength for the darker times, especially losing our much-loved sister Dorothy.

I will let the reports speak for themselves but will first highlight several new initiatives and one departure which impact on the whole of our church life.

The La Côte Ministry Team is a small group of our church members who have shown an interest in and are active in leading our worship. We set this group up in November 2018 and aim to meet monthly to pray for our worshipping life, to reflect on services and to plan for future acts of worship. These meetings encourage creativity and a variety of styles of worship and help us discern a

way forward. I have personally enjoyed exploring the church seasons together and then sharing responsibility for different services. Those who have been involved up until now are (in alphabetical order): Louise Burrows, Calen Gayle, Helen Harding, Heidi Hawkings, Chris Potter, Betty Talbot and Peta Tracey.

Council Review and re-setting priorities.

Secondly, in response to the AGM discussion last year, the Council has been addressing some of the key issues that were raised. This has been done firstly through our regular council meetings and then with an extra time of reflection together in November. On Saturday 10th November, ably facilitated by Chris Talbot, the council reviewed the two strategic priorities we have had over the last four years and re-framed these in the light of the AGM discussion and our current context. Three areas of priority emerged for the coming two years:

- ♥ Youth and children – which is still a major priority
- ♥ Visibility and Outreach – which offers a clearer focus than “Presence”

- ♥ Pastoral care – as an additional area to develop, building on much of the care for one another that is going on already, often unnoticed.

Please join us at our AGM to look at these more closely.

We value your participation in our discussions to shape *our* church life together.

We are sad to be saying good bye to Calen Gayle, who has been running our youth programme since September 2014. On behalf of our church family I would like to say a heart-felt thank you to Calen for his faithful, visionary and creative ministry among us. His focus has been with our young people, encouraging them in their personal journeys of faith and also helping them find their place in the wider church community. We are deeply grateful to him for the relationships of trust and fun and safety that he has built up with our young people, and the inspiring example of faith that he has shared with them. Under his guidance many of our youth have found a way of worshipping in our “youth band”, which has gone from strength to strength. Our young people leading the church in worship has been a huge blessing to the whole of our community. In addition, he has built strong ties with many of us who are not in the “young” bracket any more, for which we are so thankful.

I encourage you to keep Calen, Daphne and Zedek in your prayers as he settles into an 18-month placement with the Église Évangélique Reformée dans le Canton de Vaud, in Yverdon. Pray for Calen as he explores vocation further, pushing doors in Anglican ordained ministry.

Julia Chambeyron. On another sad note, my colleague and our assistant chaplain Julia has continued to explore new lines of treatment, but one element has made her much worse. So, life is very challenging for Julia and the family right now and the future looks very uncertain. We miss her ministry among us in our worship, preaching and pastoral care, not to mention her warm smile and humour. We continue to keep her and Philippe and all the family much in our prayers.

A word of thanks. Finally, I would like to thank all of you who covered our worship during my time off in January and February. This has revealed the strength of our shared leadership and I look forward to more ways of involving those who are keen to take part in the life of our La Côte Community. Please do let me know if you would like to get involved in a particular aspect of church life.



Ecumenical activities

Contacts with other churches of different denominations are an important part of the life of La Côte Anglican Church. Some of these take the form of shared public services or events and then there are various meetings in which our Chaplains and Lay Reader participate:

At the Abbaye de Bonmont - a service for the Jeûne Fédérale (3rd Sunday in Sept.) in French, German & English, prepared by the local Swiss Reformed, Roman Catholic churches & La Côte Anglican Church. Carolyn is involved in the preparation and the service.

Summer outdoor service in Nyon celebrating the Swiss National Day

together with all local churches belonging to the Pastorale Nyonnaise. This group of church leaders meets for a bi-monthly early morning breakfast in Nyon to share news, plan and pray together.

GROG, Le Groupe Œcuménique Gessien that Carolyn attended and now Betty is attending.

Remembrance ceremony in Ferney Voltaire on 11th November 2018 - Carolyn and Georges Mills represented La Côte Church marking the centenary of the end of the First World War.

The English-speaking Geneva church leaders gather over a monthly lunch at different churches.

Joint Easter sunrise service with La Dôle parish at Gingins. Carolyn organises this with Christian Heyraud, Pastor.

Participation in World Day of Prayer service with La Dôle parish. This usually takes place at Signy Chapel, using the liturgy prepared by a different country each year. Machteld Kelsey & Peta Tracey have represented LCAC over the years and would welcome others to share in this important contact with our host parish.

Cursillo - an ecumenical three-day course, offered twice a year by English-speaking churches in the Geneva area, on living a Christian life and encouraging lay leadership. Many members of La Côte have enjoyed and benefited from this weekend. Chris Talbot is its Assistant Lay Director and others from our church participate in the preparation and team.

Welcoming bossey students - once again we had the pleasure of welcoming some of the students from the Ecumenical Institute of Bossey to our church community. This past year we have had four Anglican students coming to our services: Archdeacon Emmanuel Faremi and Canon Nelson Iluno from Nigeria, Revd Dr. Njojo Kahwa from DRC and Revd Jency Manjuka from Sri Lanka. Margaret Owen has kindly coordinated the transport to/from Bossey with a few other volunteer drivers and it appears she has become well-known in the students' home countries, where future students are told they will get a warm welcome from her and La Côte Church when they arrive! It is always interesting to hear



about their background and challenges they face in their ministries back home and they in turn enjoy worshipping with us and being invited to our homes for a meal.

November 2018

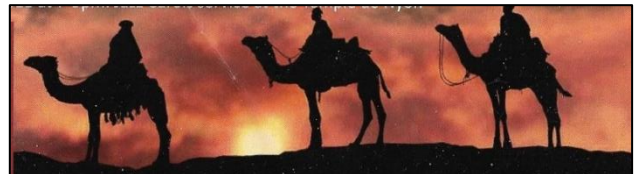
A reflective All Souls Service in Gingins commemorating those who have died.

New Faces at La Côte Ministry Team

Betty Talbot

Hello Everyone! I have been asked to provide a short bio and a description of the past year as Reader at La Côte.



I am almost 63 years old and am enjoying this season of life. My vocation is to teach. I have taught chemistry in high schools

in Sydney, Australia; produced teaching materials on human rights and refugee rights for UNHCR; and led adult Bible studies in various churches in various countries. I love teaching people of all ages to enjoy learning, be it the periodic table or the book of Leviticus! Another passion which has been with me since my teenage years, is gardening, which eventually developed into an MSc in environmental management, and that in turn has matured into a spiritual pathway where, to quote Christian writer John Ortberg, “being out in the creation opens my spirit to God,” where I read nature as “the manuscripts of God.”

I came to La Côte from St Michael’s Church in Paris, via Holy Trinity Church in Geneva. In 2002, in response to my theological questing, the assistant chaplain at St Michael’s suggested that I embark on a BA in theology, which I did with relish. I thoroughly enjoyed the courses in biblical studies, church history, ethics, liturgy, mission and spirituality, to name a few. I even appreciated learning New Testament Greek, as its rules of grammar helped me to understand French grammar! I love teaching, but I also love

learning. Last December, I graduated from St Andrews University with an M.Litt in the Bible and the Contemporary World.

In 2008, when St Michael’s lost both its Readers who moved away from Paris, the chaplain and I agreed that I would go for Readership training. In the meantime, I helped out at St Michael’s with leading and preaching and was licensed as a Reader in 2010. Chris and I returned to live in the Pays de Gex, and in 2012, at the urging of the chaplain of Holy Trinity Church, I served as a Reader there until the end of its last interregnum.

Chris and I were drawn to the La Côte church community where we already had friends, who like us, are members of the ecumenical Geneva Cursillo group.



We joined La Côte in the summer of 2016, witnessing the community living out its mission statement of “growing together in love for God and for our neighbour.” We enjoy the liveliness and family atmosphere of La Côte and appreciate very much the sensitive blend of Anglican tradition with contemporary expressions. This was evident at the service last April when I was licensed to serve as Reader at La Côte. The licensing, which was led by the Swiss Archdeacon, Canon Adele Kelham, was integrated into a Holy Communion service presided by Carolyn. The sense of camaraderie was strong and inviting, and the joy of the occasion was highlighted by the upbeat, foot-tapping music provided by Calen and his music group “Lift Every Voice,” and the

family atmosphere was further emphasized as we also celebrated the marriage of John and Béné Phillips with cake and bubbly after the service.

I have been rostered to serve at both Divonne and Gings, and at each service, receive encouragement and support through kind words and smiles, and am touched by the thoughtful engagement of congregation members who either help in the pre-service preparation of setting up the sanctuaries in either locale, or who remain afterwards to help in post-service duties.

La Côte is blessed with many talented and dedicated church members who contribute in many ways, overt and covert, to help our church community to flourish. At the same time La Côte stimulates the exercise of gifts in community. In the past months, Carolyn has drawn together a ministry team whose members serve La Côte through leading services and preaching, with each person bringing their unique personality and talents into their preparation and delivery.

As we move through the seasons of this coming year, may I ask that we appropriate for ourselves the prayer of the Apostle Paul for the Christians in the church in Ephesus (3:16-19): that God may strengthen us with power through his Spirit in our inner being, so that Christ may dwell in our hearts through faith; and that being rooted and established in love, we may have the power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses all knowledge – that we may be filled to the measure of all the fulness of God.

Since arriving in Switzerland, she has enjoyed flexing her brain muscle through regular meetings with Dr Clare Amos to discuss a wide variety of theological and biblical issues. A highlight of the year is the Divonne Nativity play. We as leaders greatly enjoyed teaching them. A regular feature during the year is a Bake Sale to raise funds for youth activities. We were sorry to see the Ives family return to the UK this past year.

Gingins Sunday Club

Six to ten-year olds

The Sunday Club has continued to be well supported by children of all ages from 2 and a half to 17. The six to ten-year olds had a break from the Roots programme last term in order to look at some familiar stories from the Old Testament starting with Adam and Eve. This led to a focus on Creation and we planted hyacinth bulbs which flowered in time for Christmas. By the October half term, we had reached the story of Joseph. November had a focus on prayer in the run up to advent and we began rehearsing for the Nativity Service. Once again, we attempted a musical, this year it was called “**Straw and Order**” where Grumpy Judge Grumps has to preside over a dispute between Donkeys and Cows after the Cows want to evict the Donkeys, and their friends, from their stable in Bethlehem. The children were really good at learning lines and turning up to rehearsal and overall it was a success.

After Christmas we have returned to the Roots programme and are planning to follow it through to Easter. We are also learning some new songs which we might sing in church at some point in the future.

Naomi continues to work with the younger group, sometimes supported by some of the volunteers listed below but we could really do with new volunteers. Naomi’s programme has to some extent mirrored ours but with activities really geared towards the three to six-year olds. They tend to stay with the older ones at the very beginning for a game and or to practise a song and then go upstairs for their story and activities.

The groups could not continue if it wasn’t for all the support from the whole church community. In particular, we would like to thank the team of fantastic

volunteer leaders; Alice Debell, Kate Shepherd, Tania Ahlstrom and Mary Gossal, Helen Harding. Also, this year we have really benefited from Carolyn’s and Calen’s support, we will miss Calen but wish him all the best in Yverdon. We are looking forward to working with the new youth leader when appointed.

Youth Work Report

In this fifth and final year of youth work with La Côte, I continue to learn about the depths of devotion expressed by members of our community. And the challenges and growth of our young people



Chatfaith (Divonne)

We were again thrilled with Fiona Ball’s final pre-university contribution, but also the work Chatfaith crowd put in to thinking through elements of Scripture and the Christmas story to supplement the already mirthful and thoughtful text. Beyond this, we have had a good time discussing all sorts of topics linked more or less to following Christ (the end of the world, the big bang and God, Brexit at least once or a few dozen times). This year has also seen some newer arrivals to the group, some infrequently present, but still willing to come along and meet the other young people: at least six newcomers (again not every service, but still).

Chatfaith has largely been the purview of myself and our fearless Ed Kelley. In March, Tommy and Meghan Bresson, hailing from Youth Compass (Youth for Christ or YFC), will take up the challenge.

Sunday Club in Gingins is engaging, exciting and funny: so why, who or what is causing us to have lower numbers?

We have welcomed at least two newer families, but also said goodbyes to certain ones whose families have moved or simply stopped attending regularly. This, combined with other seasonal absences, has taken the average of Sunday club from 8 to 5. It is worth noting that many of those not regularly at Sunday Club have attended quite regularly the SAS gatherings, similarly Sherbert and other one-off interchurch events. The Youth Band, however, grows both in participants and quality. Younger children seem interested also: a new generation of musical worshipers on our hands? Repairs of the Auberge down the road have changed our venue, now at the building adjacent the Poste. In the interim, Christian Heyraud, pastor of the EERV congregation, provided his study. Students praying for each other after our sessions continues to encourage; we may be few, but we are growing in our relationship with God.

Sherbert

This group is the shining hidden gem of our youth work. These young people, some of them not showing up often on Sundays despite being confirmed (a fact of which they have been lovingly reminded) have developed very innovative approaches to living their faith, including asking questions of Christianity's benefit for the developing world, how to handle depression as a believer, and questions tied to relationships, of the platonic and non-platonic varieties. Members have been part of Samedi de Partage, Taizé (in Geneva and Bourgogne), Project

Compassion (last year in Serbia, this year in Romania). Our shingle reads "every other Saturday in Nyon at the Fraternelle bureau." Helen Harding and Armel Ayegnon will lead this group post-March.

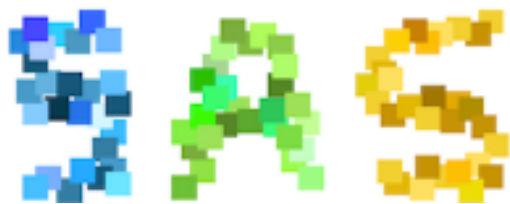
SAS

Chaplaincy Council Report



The Chaplaincy Council held 10 meetings in the period between the 2018 and 2019 AGM. At last year's AGM (2018) Diantha Terry was elected as a Council Member. Dwight Moe was re-elected as a Church Warden and re-elected as Lay Vice-Chairman. Austin Ball and Liz Bramley were re-elected as Church Wardens.

Finances. The Council agreed after having received advice from La Côte's auditor, that no further contributions to Carolyn's Church of England Clergy Pension fund would be made as there may be some conflict with Swiss pension regulations and could pose a problem with significant financial implications for La Côte. Once again Gift Day netted a healthy figure of CHF 24,000. The sale of "Pocket Crosses" greatly contributed to cash income

Ministry Team. In agreement with the Council, Carolyn has formed a small ministry team to meet monthly. Proposed members of this team are Chris Potter, Helen Harding, training as a Reader, Betty Talbot Reader and Louise Burrows (currently exploring ordination). The aim is to keep the wider worship fresh and be creative and for reflection after the service

Church Visibility and Outreach. The Council continues to recognise the importance of raising awareness of La Côte Church's presence in the region and underlining the fact that La Côte was a self-supporting church. To this means, La Côte participated in this year's **Expat Expo** event providing visitors with information packages,

videos and the opportunity to interact with La Côte families. The welcome package leaflets have been updated and published. The Council is currently working on a new La Côte website which will offer more opportunities to provide links to other events and sermons.

Youth Leader Calen Gayle before our youth leader for the past five years, leaving La Côte to explore other areas of ministry, the Council has been reviewing La Côte's needs with respect to our youth ministry and the prospects of fulfilling this role with a new youth Leader. The council has also been evaluating the financial implications. So far, one individual has been interviewed for the role. Meanwhile, Meghan and Tommy Bresson from Youth for Christ are assisting La Côte with youth work during this transition period.

Safe-Guarding Policy. The Council continues to work closely with the Diocese in implementing safe-guarding policies at La Côte. The council have all completed the Level 1 training. The safeguarding team, Christine Warren, Cassie Whetham, and Catherine Bichara have facilitated several training days for Level 2 certification.

AGM 2018 Feedback. The Council took on board the opinions raised at last year's AGM. To this effect, the Council instigated a workshop in November facilitated by Chris Talbot to review La Côte progress over the past years and set new priorities based on the congregation feedback.

Church Priorities. The Council has determined three strategic priorities for La Côte's three-year plan; that being Youth, Visibility and Outreach and Pastoral Care.

Adult Christian Education. The Council recognised the importance of adult Christian development. The council agreed that the Lenten seminars was an example of this and should be continued.

The Synod of the Anglican Archdeaconry of Switzerland, 2018–2019

As the largest diocese of the Anglican church, the Diocese in Europe has chaplaincies as distant from each other as Reykjavik in the west, Ulaanbaatar in the east and Casablanca in the south. The diocese currently has seven archdeacons, of which Switzerland is one.

The archdeaconry of Switzerland holds synod meetings twice a year. All Anglican chaplains in Switzerland are invited to attend, along with lay representatives from each church. During 2018, the winter synod took place in January at St Ursula's Church in Berne while the summer synod was held at All Saints Church in Vevey. In January 2019 the synod was again held in Berne.

Chaplaincy payments to the diocese's Common Fund

The January 2018 synod devoted more time than usual to finances since chaplaincies were being requested to pay an increased annual contribution to the diocesan budget to help fund the strategy. At the beginning of last year, the diocesan office already notified chaplaincies of a proposed financial plan which would increase the annual chaplaincy contributions to the so-called diocesan "Common Fund". Synod members felt that there had been insufficient consultation with the chaplaincies and drafted a motion stating just that for submission to the diocesan synod in May last year.

In June 2018 the Swiss archdeaconry synod was informed that a working group consisting of one representative from each archdeaconry in the Diocese in Europe would be convened to conduct "a review of the current common fund sharing formula



... with

a view to making the formula more equitable".

The January 2019 meeting of the Swiss archdeaconry synod heard that the review had so far raised a number of issues, namely: the need for transparency as to how a chaplaincy's share of the Common Fund is calculated, the need for a new Common Fund formula based on a standard set of accounts with clear accounting instructions, the need to take account of essential elements that a chaplaincy has to pay for, and the need to take account of the differences in cost of living, social security and tax systems across the diocese. In addition, the review highlighted the need to build up reserves to cover well-documented and justified projects, to protect restricted funds for specific purposes, the need for each chaplaincy to have a clear Mission Plan, and the need for the diocese to improve its communication policy.

The working group will meet again in April and then report to the diocesan synod in June 2019. The report will no doubt be further discussed by the archdeaconry synod in July.

Patterns of religion in Europe

Dr Grace Davie, Professor of Sociology at the University of Exeter in the United Kingdom, addressed the archdeaconry synod in July 2018 on patterns of religion in Europe – her main research focus. She noted how religious belief is growing in

most parts of the world but is declining in Europe. Christian religion in Europe thrived owed much of its success in the past to its links with government and the state. Churches tended to be seen as territorial and over the centuries have become what Dr Davie referred to as a “public utility”. In the United Kingdom this has become a major problem in that the Anglican Church has an infrastructure bigger than the number of people using it. Rural churches in Britain are in considerable difficulty although in some cases urban churches are experiencing a revival.

The presence of other religions in the UK has brought religion to prominence in public discussion, but among the British in general the clear trend is towards secularization. Religious literacy is declining and very many children now leave school with no idea about what religion is. Interestingly, the only two (British) Anglican dioceses that are growing are London and the Diocese in Europe.

As Europe has modernized, it has grown increasingly secularized. Yet that is not happening in much of the rest of the world where Christian belief is expanding greatly.

It was also interesting to learn that, in the UK’s Brexit referendum, a disproportionate number of Christians voted to leave the European Union. As “**Christianity Today**” wrote in June 2016, “nearly six in ten of those who identified as Christian voted for Brexit. This is significantly higher than the 52% who voted for Brexit across the nation.” Among Muslim and Hindu voters, in contrast, seven in 10 voted to remain. - €750 to Eclat a charity based in the Pays de Gex and assisting the families of handicapped children.

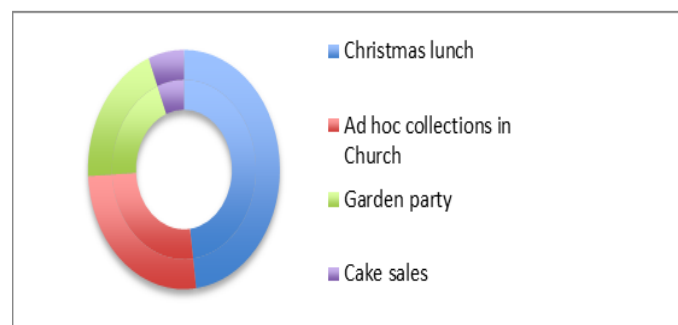

An application submitted to the French Authorities for *Association culturelle* status under the Law of 1905, in addition to our present Law of 1901 status, was turned down in March last year by the authorities on the grounds that, it was no longer possible for an Association to benefit from both statuses. It was decided to shelve further action.

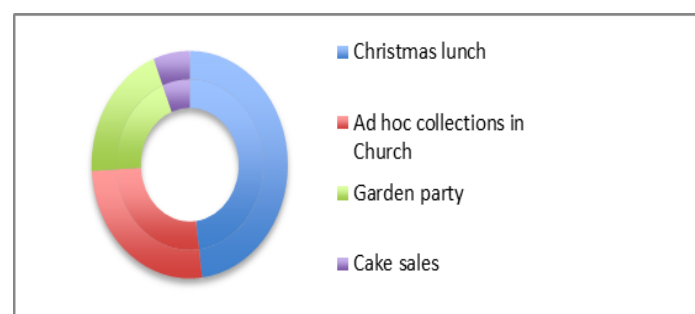
The topic of the Lenten Seminars this year is "*The Ethics of Death and Dying: Christian Perspectives*" commencing March 20th.

Throughout the rest of the year, we plan to pursue our traditional activities in support of charities and welfare organizations, including the annual Summer Garden Party in Divonne and the

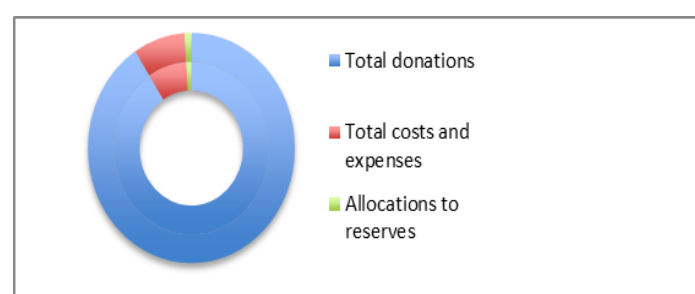
traditional Christmas lunch. Further events may be held as opportunities arise over the course of the year.

Safeguarding at La Côte

Our work as Safeguarding Officers at La Cote has continued in 2018 helping and encouraging our volunteers to complete police check clearance and attend training days. We are encouraged by the growing awareness and understanding of the importance of protecting our children, young people and vulnerable adults within our chaplaincy and outside.

Our Wardens and everyone who works with children or vulnerable adults are required to complete clearance checks for all countries they have lived in for over 6 months since the age of 16. As an international community this may seem extensive with so many of our congregation having lived and worked worldwide but we are a committed team who is ever ready to help you through the process. We thank everyone who has completed clearance for their commitment and encourage others who have not, to persevere. We have been in constant discussion about clearance requirements with the Diocesan Office in London, and we are awaiting a new protocol for Europe in April and May 2019. We have started networking with other Safeguarding officers in Switzerland and following an initiative by Archdeacon, Adele Kelham, a meeting of Safeguarding Officers is being organized in Bern on June 29th. We welcome this and Christine and Catherine will attend.

Our training programme on increasing awareness about safeguarding is going well. In May we organized the second all-day level 2 training course for all who had newly completed the on-line level 1 courses. We thank everyone who attended, and it was a very successful day. In November we decided to initiate the first ever open to all session to work on the level 1 online course on Child Protection as a group. An internet link was established in the parish room in Gingsins by Johan Crocoll and 5 people attended. The feedback was positive and those who attended appreciated sharing and discussing the contents of this course over tea and cake. We were congratulated on this initiative by the Diocesan Office who sent each attendee a certificate. Our grateful thanks to Johan without whom we could not have managed. In 2019 we plan to organize a similar open course for the level 1 on adult protection. We encourage you to come along, whether you have already completed the course or not. Discussions are both interesting and help to raise awareness within our community. The more that attend – the greater the awareness.

Sadly, Cassie Whetham will be standing down from our team and we will miss a great team member very much. We have appreciated her commitment and good advice. Thus, we will be looking for more support to join us on the Safeguarding team in the next few months.

Outreach and visibility at La Côte

Expat Expo 2018 Geneva

In response to a suggestion made at our AGM 2018, last year we secured a place for La Côte Church to be present at the annual Expat Exposition in Geneva. The event was held on Sunday 4 November at the Starling Hotel next to Palexpo.

The event runs for one day each year and features stands for local business and groups, to showcase the services they offer. The aim is to act as a resource for newcomers to the Geneva area, so that they may feel supported and made aware of various opportunities and activities in their new living environment.

In preparation, we summarised all our church activity groups and displayed this information on 2 large notice boards, along with information about our two churches and the services we offer. Given that the date of the event was November, we also printed fliers with our Advent service dates on, to hand out. We had some SAS and La Côte general information



fliers also. Posters previously made by the younger members of our community were also displayed.

On the day of the event, the organisers reported an increase in visitors of up to 50%, compared to 2017. As this was our first time as a Church at this event, it was difficult to assess what success would look like. However, the interest and comments we received on the day were all very positive. Many people went away with

fliers and information about our upcoming Advent services.



It was also noted by a few how lovely it was to see a few different churches present at the event – Westlake Church were also there, but for their second year at this event. It was felt generally that our presence complemented each other.

Several people passed by from Cursillo and other organisations, so it was a blessing to have Betty, Louise and Calen present, who knew many there. There were also some exhibitors who may be of interest to us as a church, for talks and other activities.

In later feedback from church services at both Gingins and Divonne during December, it was noted that we had several newcomers, due to our presence at the Expat Expo. As our goal was to increase our visibility in our local area and encourage people to come along to our services, the council viewed this a success and feel it is an important opportunity to be part of again, going forward.

Asylum Support

MENTORING

A six-month pilot phase of the 'Mentoring for Integration' (MINT) project, started by Joy Stephens, was undertaken by Eileen Wiley and Andrea Goovaerts. The purpose of the project is to contribute to the orientation and integration of asylum seekers and refugees into life in Switzerland.

The aim is to pair a personal mentor with an asylum seeker in order to guide and follow their progress until full integration and financial independence, through to eventual employment.

The pilot aims were to:

- ♥ evaluate the effectiveness of the project
- ♥ recruit, orient/induct and support/guide mentors
- ♥ Identify mentees and pair with mentors
- ♥ Organise and lead regular mentor team meetings to pool experiences and share ideas on how to best support each other
- ♥ revise and develop guidelines and training manual

The pilot scheme concluded in Spring 2018, with the creation of a Swiss Association '**COUP DE MAIN**' to coordinate the MINT mentoring project as well as other activities (advocacy, legal assistance, social activities) to help migrants integrate. A web site www.coupdemain-ch.weebly.com has been set up to keep us informed and help keep in contact with the very geographically



displaced migrants and volunteers, now that the EVAM day centres and shelters have been closed. The members of the Association meet regularly, and MINT mentors also meet to share information and experience. There are presently nine mentors working with mentees under the project.

During February 2019 a Jobs Search Workshop was organised for the asylum seekers and refugees by Vivienne and Chris Talbot and Vincent Woo to assist with creation of CVs and letters of motivation, improve interview presentation and skills and search for jobs.

Summer b-b-qs, Westlake friendship meals and meals in private homes, pizza nights and walks have continued on a smaller scale due to diminished numbers of migrants in La Côte area. Anyone interested in learning more about this project and mentoring, please contact
