A new heaven and a new earth

Einstein said that the most important question is "Is the Universe a friendly place?" The signs don't look good: terrorism; environmental disasters; illness; bereavement; the sudden death last week of a young and talented author and bible scholar. The world is not as it should be. Evil very much exists, and we have every right to be angry at the injustices we see, and ask with the psalmist why it seems God has forsaken us. The comforting words of Julian of Norwich "all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well" could be seen as a mere platitude in the light of global and personal tragedies.

In Sunday's reading from Revelation we see a revelation of God's eternal character (Tom Wright – *Revelation for Everyone*). "God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eye."

Hope is important.

We do not deny the pain, grief or worry, and yet we keep going. It is good to be reminded that the eternal desire of our loving God is to wipe away our tears. The same God who, through the incarnation, wept with those who mourn, and knew pain and suffering. In remembering that all is held in love we can hold up our heads and say that one day, piece by piece, all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.
