Reflection and prayer for week of 12 to 19 January from Carolyn and Louise Burrows

Last week, at our Signy Chapel Eucharist, Louise offered us a reflection below, based on the story of the Epiphany. As we hear about all manner of unrest and tragedies unfolding, the story reminds us to look up: to keep looking to God at all times and in all places... Louise writes:

"The story of epiphany starts with the wise men seeing a star. I wonder how many other people looked up and noticed that star? If any of them did, none of them appear to have followed it. Perhaps people were too distracted by their problems, or too ground down by their daily drudge to look up and see it. So often, we keep our gaze on the ground, just keeping afloat, coping with the things that life throws at us. But the Magi were not content to live like that. They understood that to truly live, we need to keep looking up. If we keep our eyes to the ground, we easily become preoccupied by our troubles.

Someone once told me not to look at the snakes, referring to the story of Moses in which poisonous snakes were biting the Israelites. Moses made a bronze snake for the people to look up at if they had been bitten, to receive healing. Rather than looking down at the snakes in our lives, we are to look up at the one who can heal us and sustain us.

Perhaps others did not follow because the star was not eye-catching, did not shine any brighter than other stars. God too does not dazzle or overwhelm us, but gently invites. And like the Christmas star, God is there throughout the journey of our lives: gently leading. All through the magi's long journey, they kept looking up so they wouldn't lose their way, and the star guided them to their destination.

Let us, similarly, keep looking up to God so that we don't lose our way. The magi were so inspired by what they saw, that they started a journey with no promise of success, but at the end of it, they were overwhelmed with joy. May we have that same reward as we make our journey with Christ."

Dear Lord.

We "look up" to you at the start of 2020, and pray for all those on our hearts at the moment who are struggling with ill-health, bereavement, natural disasters, tragic happenings. Thank you loving God that you became flesh and shared our frail humanity, identifying with our struggles. Draw close to those who are especially suffering and reveal your love and goodness to them through the love and care of others around them.

In the name of Christ, Emmanuel, God is with us, Amen.
