# Message from Carolyn

WORDS... 'sticks and stones will break my bones but words will never hurt me' is one of the least true sayings in my experience...

From within our closest circles to far flung communities, words have the potential to wreak havoc. You may remember the shocking news of a shooting in an Arizona supermarket back in January 2011, in which a US congresswoman was seriously wounded and six people died. There were rumours circulating at the time that Sarah Palin's tweet 'Don't retreat, instead – reload!' may have added fuel to this politically motivated attack. Critics warned her and others to tone down their language and the unhelpful connotations between politics and guns.

Words written down, words flying across the world via our media, internet, email, Twitter, Facebook, text or combox messages – all once 'out there' take on a life of their own. Words, open to multiple interpretations, have the power to change things for good or for evil. I hardly dare continue putting words on this page!

I wonder what memories of words you have which have stayed with you through your life? I'm sure we all have regrets about some of the words we have uttered in the heat of the moment. I will never forget the string of expletives that spewed from my mouth, as a teenager, when I accidentally slipped down the stairs, landing at the feet of several shocked parishioners who were chatting with my Mum in our vicarage hallway! A few years later, I spent a gap year living with a missionary family in Paraguay. I noticed how the father chose his words with care. When I asked him about this he explained that he was often inspired by reading the book of Proverbs with its many references to the wise use of words.

At the memorial service of those who died in the Arizona shooting Barak Obama, no doubt with the help of his word smiths, chose his words with care. He moved the public away from laying the blame at Palin's door and instead he urged that "At a time when our discourse has become so sharply polarized... it's important for us to pause for a moment and make sure that we are talking with each other in a way that heals, not a way that wounds." Surely this is a prophetic word for all of us to grasp and strive to put into practice in our private and public lives.

How and what we communicate are a crucial part of our La Côte Church life – both within our church body and how we relate to our wider community. The Bible has plenty of wisdom to offer on this matter. The book of James offers us a sobering image: 'the tongue is a fire which no one can tame' (James 3). Being an extrovert who often thinks out loud, I for one need to ask for God's help with James' challenge to 'be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger', (James 1.19). My prayer for our La Côte church community is that with God's help we will be known as people who listen and talk to each other in a way that heals. I hope too that this newsletter will be another tool in our communications bag which speaks of God's hope and welcome for all.

In the midst of our often busy and noise-filled lives, finding a moment to be silent before God, will help us to check and to choose our words with care. I end with this prayer.

Saviour, teach me the silence of humility, the silence of wisdom, the silence of love, the silence of perfection, the silence that speaks without words, the silence of faith. Lord, teach me to silence my own heart that I may listen to the movement of the Holy Spirit within me and sense the depths which are of God.

### " Let the little children come to me "

These often-quoted words which Jesus spoke to the crowds following him remind us of his love for children and the value that he placed on their presence. As happened so frequently, Jesus pushed his followers' thinking further than they may have felt comfortable with: "...do not hinder them for the kingdom of



heaven belongs to such as these." Those around Jesus were used to seeing the idea of the kingdom in very adult terms – as a political ideal, as a way of gaining freedom from oppression, as a land which they could govern themselves. Yet Jesus subverted these ideas and talked about the kingdom as a place where human beings would be at their best, where all human relationships would be good and where God's will would be desired and worked for. Part of this was about the humility and trust that adults often lack but that children display: "...unless you change and become like little

children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

At La Côte we work hard at creating an environment where children may discover God with us. We are committed to providing good programmes to share the Christian story with children and we are very grateful indeed to all who lead our children's groups in both Gingins and Divonne. We make every effort to include the children in our worship and give them the space, safety and support to express themselves so that we may also learn from them. We provide a warm welcome for families so that all may feel comfortable as we gather and come before God together. Since Carolyn's arrival we have seen an increase in the number of families and children who are joining us and this is a great joy. As we review our child protection procedures in the light of the new Archdeaconry guidelines, it is a good time to both ensure their safety amongst us, and to renew our commitment to children and remind ourselves that they represent the future not only of our churches, but of our society and of our world. At the same time, we demonstrate what we believe about the nature of God through the way in which we open our community life to children. "...whoever welcomes a little child like this in my name welcomes me."

the bar and in the

kitchen. Food and drink alone raised almost one quarter of the total profit: (about CHF 8,000.-). This money will be used to fund the ministry of our church and the various charities we support. The team would like to thank everyone who helped the Spring Fair achieve this brilliant result, whether by working at the stands, putting up posters or by coming along to buy. It was a convivial community event, and showed what La Côte folk can do when they put their minds to it!

# **Council Update**

Following elections at this year's Annual General Meeting in March, the newly formed La Côte chaplaincy council convened in May with members from both congregations in Gingins and Divonne. We began our first meeting of the new church calendar year with a short communion service, discussed the role of the elected PCC, and set priorities for the year ahead. Among these will be a reexamination of the whole area of communications, which was the focus of our discussion at the AGM. The Council will look into new ways to make these more effective both within our church community and beyond, and has set up a sub-group to look into the technical aspects. Keeping an eye on finances is also a necessary part of the Council's responsibilities. The pledge scheme was re-launched at the beginning of the year and the Council will consider how to encourage members of the congregation to think about how they give. The Treasurer reported that the end of April, figures showed that we were more or less on track. However, in line with budget predictions, in order to balance income and expenditure at the end of the year, our community will have to find about CHF20,000.- from fundraising and donations. Another top priority for the Council will be to focus on reaching out to young people. Working in this area is of vital importance for the future of our church and during the coming year we will be spending some time on this topic.



# **Asylum Gardening Project**

Onions, leeks, courgettes, tomatoes, aubergines, beans, peppers, carrots and herbs, about CHF80 worth of vegetable seedlings were kindly donated by M. Guichard's enterprise at Borex! Now they are growing in the garden. Ten asylum seekers are signed up to the gardening project, and every week four or five of them come to work in the garden. They also have a "pot" garden at their social centre (Mama Africa) in Nyon. Please drop in to visit the garden, or to help, on any Thursday evening between 6.30 and 9.00 pm. After working, we share a meal together and you are welcome to join us. Come and meet Sharif, for example: a friendly Kurd from Iran who is stateless, hence unable to legally work or to marry. The problem was caused by



an error made by a clerk when copying his father's family name into a register!

# The Bible: opening a closed book for today

In 1607, King James I of England commissioned a team of forty-seven men to create a new translation of the Bible. Four years later, the work was finished: eighty-one chapters of prose and poetry that were destined to become one of the most read works of all time: the King James Bible, or the Authorized Version. This year the world is celebrating the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the KJV as a holy book and as a literary masterpiece.

A study day to mark the anniversary of the publication of the King James Version of the Bible, to explore the history of the translation and parallel issues for the use of the Bible in contemporary mission and ministry in Europe, will be held on Saturday 17 September 2011, venue: Theologisches Seminar St. Chrischona, Chrischonarain 200, CH-4126 Bettingen, Basel. The day has been organized by the Anglican Church in Basel on behalf of the Swiss Archdeaconry of the Church of England Diocese in Europe (SACEP). Key speakers are the Diocesan Bishop, Geoffrey Rowell, Grace Davie, Professor of Sociology at the University of Exeter (UK), and Thomas Schlag, Professor at the

University of Zürich. The day is open to all and will be held in English. It will cost CHF 35 with lunch, and runs from 10:00 to 16:00. Overnight accommodation is available.

The day is suitable for church members, students and anyone interested in this fascinating topic. Bishop Geoffrey Rowell will speak on the history of the KJV. Grace Davie has researched and written extensively on the sociology of religion with a focus on trends in Europe. Her topic is "Hearing the Bible today: understanding the Western European context". Prof. Schlag will speak on opening the Bible for a new generation of children and young people. A roundtable discussion will consider the place of the Bible in public discourse, transmission of the Word in a visual society and using the Bible with confidence in the life of the local church. There will be readings from the KJV and music and a small exhibition of facsimiles of historic Bibles. "The Bible: opening a closed book for today" is organised in partnership with Theologisches Seminar St. Chrischona and STH Basel.
