Message from Carolyn

Thanksgiving and celebration at the heart of our faith



I wonder why some people, especially children, find saying thank you difficult. Maybe the Portuguese expression of thanks sheds light on this question. The Portuguese say 'obrigado' or 'obrigada', which more literally translates 'I am obliged to you'. In saying thank you, you express an obligation to another, an underlying indebtedness. Indeed 'obligare' has its root in the Latin word 'ligare' which means to bind or tie up. Saying "thank you" somehow ties you in to another.

Some of you may be familiar with the children's chorus 'If I were a butterfly, I'd thank you Lord for giving me wings.' I remember, as a teenager, cowering in the pews as my grandmother enthusiastically led our church in song and actions encouraging us all to be wiggly worms that thanked God that we could squirm, (most of us in the pews!) As an adolescent with unruly curly hair I begrudgingly sang 'If I were a fuzzy wuzzy bear, I'd thank you Lord for my fuzzy

wuzzy hair!' Yet I have to admit in my 'old age' that I like the theology of this song: giving thanks to God for what he has given to us. It is worth quoting the chorus in full:

'For you gave me a heart and you gave me a smile, you gave me Jesus and you made me your child, and I just thank you Father for making me, me.'

In childlike simplicity we say thank you to God for the gift of creation, of life, of being human and able to feel and think and relate to others. We give thanks for the gift of Jesus Christ who has reconciled us to God, making us children of God, co-heirs with Christ. At this point I say thank you to the Divonne children and youth for leading us in singing this chorus a few weeks ago. People in the Bible sometimes forgot to say thank you. Take the ten lepers whom Jesus healed. Only

one of them remembered to turn back to thank him. The other nine were more concerned about going to the temple to show that they were clean, putting ritual before what is most important - thanking God.

Many people believe that miracles like the one described in the story do not happen. When asked what he thought about miracles, Albert Einstein, one of the greatest scientists of the 20th century, said the following:

'There are only two ways to live your life: as though nothing is a miracle, or as though everything is a miracle.'

As our wonder for life is heightened, so our thankfulness increases, and we don't take things for granted, but make the small things count as we notice them with gratitude. Our starting place, each day, along with children, is one of thankfulness and indebtedness to God. We may not have had a good start in life, we may have been deeply wounded by what life has thrown at us – but we are nevertheless urged to give thanks to God in all things. (Philippians 4.6) This does not undermine suffering but it does call us back to the basics of indebtedness to God – creator, giver of life, redeemer, Lord and friend – whatever title inspires you most to give thanks.

Our autumn season of thanksgiving and celebration

We are embarking on a season of thanksgiving in our church life with harvest celebrations in the autumn and our La Côte Church 25th anniversary celebration on 6 November. I take this opportunity to thank God for the richness of our church life, for each individual member, with their unique story and contribution to make to our church family. I give thanks for young and old, for the rich diversity of life experiences and cultures which we share. I look forward to giving thanks for the way La Côte

has grown into the church community it is today, when we celebrate 25 years of life here in this region of France and Switzerland.

Thanksgiving is more than just saying 'Thank you' however heartfelt these words might be. JF Kennedy is quoted as saying

'As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words, but to live by them."

In a similar vein of gratitude, King David acknowledged his thanks and indebtedness to God in what he offered back to God with this prayer:

Blessed are you, God of Israel, for ever and ever, for yours is the greatness, the power, the glory, the splendour and the majesty.

And now we give you thanks, our God, and praise your glorious name.

For all things come from you, and of your own have we given you.

(An extract from the Song of David in 1 Chronicles 29)

As we acknowledge that all we have comes from God, we are able to hold more lightly to our possessions. If all is gift, then it is ours to use with great care, out of respect for and in line with the generous giver. This autumn our services and some of our Bible study groups will explore how we value the gifts entrusted to us, and how we use them in God's purposes. Rest assured, that as we explore these questions as a church, no one will be looking over anyone's shoulder. We are not aiming at an open debate around who spends what and how. Rather we are seeking to create a healthy and liberating conversation around money which I hope will help us all grow to maturity in this area of our faith.

LA CÔTE ANGLICAN CHURCH, A SUCCESS STORY IN THE DIOCESE IN EUROPE

It all started 25 years ago when a small group of Christians, who mainly attended Holy Trinity Church in Geneva, met regularly for prayer and Bible study in the La Côte region. They realized that there was a good number of them scattered along the shores of the lake Léman and that there could be scope for more. Thanks to their efforts, including those of John Tracey, Chairman of the Development Association, La Côte has grown into the church family we have today, with two

worshipping centres in Gingins, Switzerland and in neighbouring France at Divonne.

Anglican services first began in the Temple de Gingins, Vaud in November 1986. Mervyn Puleston, the chaplain of Holy Trinity, Geneva at that time, conducted the services held once a month and encouraged the nascent congregation. Later, Martha Clark, who was

appointed Assisting Priest by Holy Trinity in 1997, took care of our community on a part-time basis, and we moved to two services a month. We maintained our close links with Holy Trinity, supported by succeeding chaplains Keith Kimber and Mike French and Assisting Priest, Sue Nightingale, who all helped us towards our goal of becoming an independent congregation led by our own chaplain. This was to be Paul Holley, who was appointed Priest in charge in 2003, and by

that time we were holding weekly services in Gingins. Shortly after his arrival the first La Côte chaplaincy council was elected. Austin Ball and Liz Bramley were our first churchwardens. In 2005, a second congregation was established at Divonne. This demonstrated the dynamic Christian faith in the lives of many who have attended. Julia Chambeyron, Assistant Curate, who has taken care of the Divonne congregation has long been a member of our community and was licensed as a Reader in 2002. She went on to pursue further theological training and formation. She was ordained deacon in 2006, and priest in 2007. By this time the two congregations were each running a lively Sunday Club for our youngsters and the first of our four youth interns arrived in 2004. They helped with the development of our work with



young people to which Ted Talbot and Peta Tracev have made an enormous contribution, not forgetting of the late Gail Farrel1 and many other

dedicated volunteers from both congregations.

In 2010 a new Constitution was adopted and La Côte finally achieved the status of an independent chaplaincy within the Diocese in Europe. Carolyn Cooke was appointed chaplain after Paul Holley resigned the same year, in order to manage the Anglican Health Network. Bishop Geoffrey said that the La Côte chaplaincy was one of the success stories of the Diocese during the past decade and that it had been good to see how this congregation had grown through the years to a point where it could support a full-time chaplain.

Ish is a well-known Christian musician and songwriter, now a Church of England deacon attached to Chichester Cathedral. Irene has a special interest in working with children and families and is soon to start training for ordained ministry too. Ish spoke movingly about his troubles with cancer, and the loss of their baby grandson to a rare form of the disease just over a year ago. He regaled us with some of his own songs, bringing our worship to a close with the song "Bigger Barns" (including dance moves), a great hit with children and adults. Many thanks to Eric and Luciana for organising the visit and bringing Ish and Irene along to our church.



COUNCIL UPDATE

Council met on 20 June 2011 before the summer break. Rosemary Raedler, Treasurer at Christ Church, Lausanne was invited to attend this meeting to share with us her experience of of setting up a charitable association for her church. This has also been done at St. Ursula's, Bern. La Côte was looking into the possibility of gaining tax benefits for us. Lausanne had decided to do this because donations were vitally needed to pay for the heavy costs of restoring the church building, a listed monument. Although tax deductions are applicable to donations to the charitable association, they could only be used to fund limited building and heating costs, and not the stipend. This would mean that for La Côte, pledges and money collected to finance the running of the church could not be paid from the charitable association funds. Two years ago, the Canton de Vaud voted a Resolution whereby the Swiss Catholic and Reformed Churches obtained cantonal financial support. At that time, the Jewish community was officially recognized, but received no financial benefit. If the Anglican application for cantonal recognition were eventually successful, it would be unlikely that this would result in tax benefits. The Council will keep the idea of the creation of a charitable association in mind, but does not plan to take further action in the short term.

Also discussed at this meeting were La Côte communications and the Newsletter. An editorial policy is being developed by the communications group. The website will be revamped and the team is exploring ways of making the most of its potential.

Finally, La Côte Church has requested the Bishop's permission for Ken Kvistad to officiate under the ecumenical canons. This will be in a non-stipendiary capacity, recognizing Ken's contribution to our church community over many years, helping pastorally, with leading reflections and Bible study groups. Ken will assist Carolyn and Julia, and will have a similar involvement with the Holy Trinity congregation in Geneva.


